Trail Guide



CROSS RIVER PRESERVE

Wiscasset Rd (Rt. 27)
Boothbay, Maine

Cross River Preserve is an easily accessed preserve right off of Rt. 27 as you enter the town of Boothbay. An easy one-mile loop trail extends through forested woodland and along a freshwater wetland and stream, out to the tidal shoreline and mudflats of the Cross River.

The Cross River is a tidal basin extending southeast of the Ovens Mouth passage. It boasts the longest stretch of undeveloped water frontage on the Boothbay peninsula with scenic, panoramic views from the trail. These tidal flats host a variety of marine species including clams, crabs, and lobster larvae, as well as the migratory shorebirds that feed on them.
