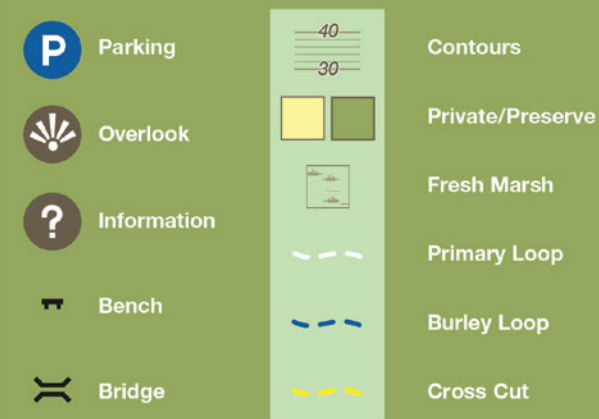

LINEKIN & BURLEY PRESERVES

Ocean Point Rd (Rt 96)
East Boothbay, Maine

Linekin and Burley Preserves encompass two adjacent nature preserves with frontage along the Damariscotta River. Visitors can enjoy nearly 3 miles of wooded trails that traverse a variety of terrains, including hardwood forest, streams, woodland ponds, rock ledges, and a gravel shoreline along the Damariscotta River with views across to South Bristol and the White Islands. The trails are moderate to challenging with a particularly challenging steep, narrow stretch beyond the yellow crosscut trail and along the shore. The trail approaching the shore includes a right-of-way section through private property where visitors are asked to stay on the trail and be respectful of the privacy of the neighbor. The Burley Loop extends to the south for a larger loop hike along the Little River with views of a pond and beaver dam.
