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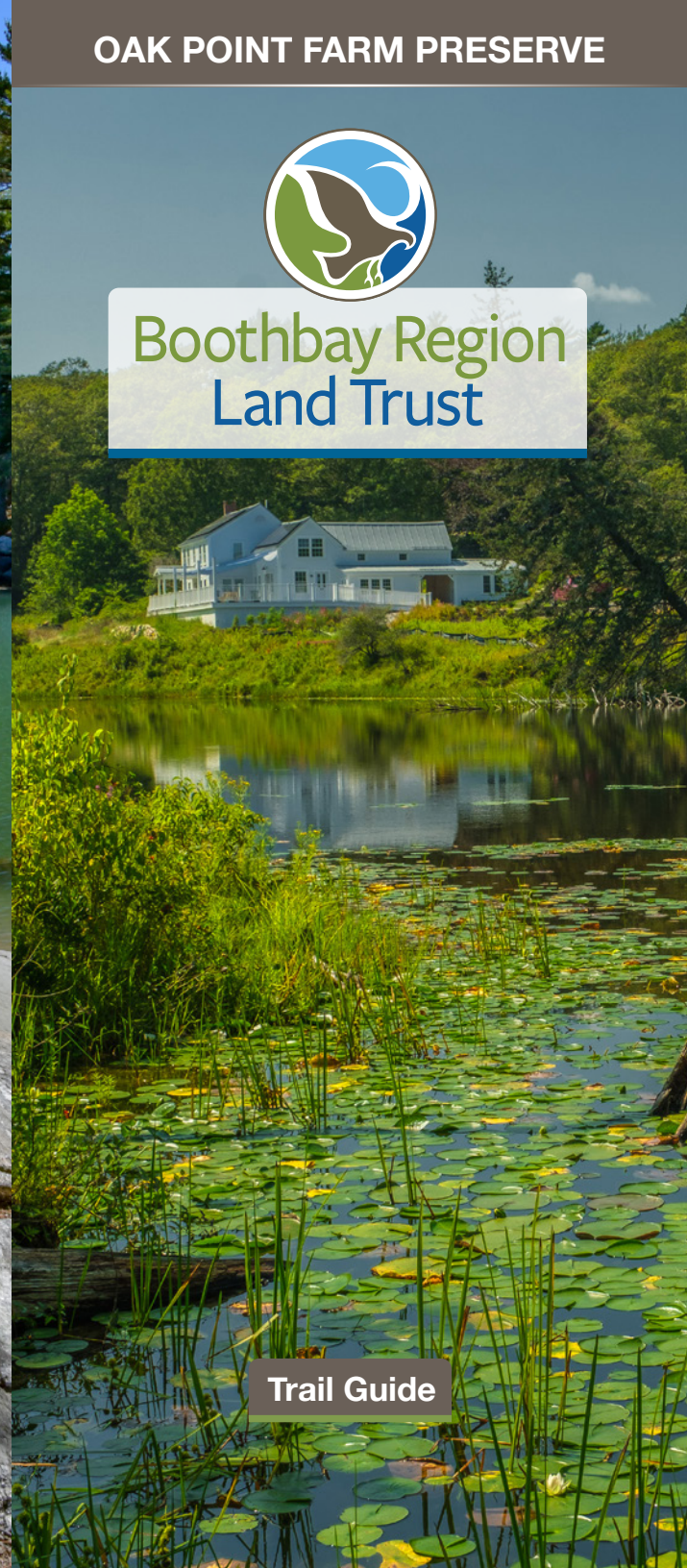

OAK POINT FARM PRESERVE

Samoset Rd
Boothbay Harbor, Maine

Situated on 2,000+ feet of shoreline on Hodgdon Cove, Oak Point Farm serves as Boothbay Region Land Trust's visitor center and headquarters. On the site of a historic saltwater farm, the preserve offers an easy 1-mile loop trail. 0.6 miles of this trail is universally accessible and suitable for wheelchairs or strollers. With stunning shoreline views, a large freshwater pond, fields, forest, a children's natural playground, and a heritage orchard, Oak Point Farm hosts a unique variety of habitats perfect for all ages. The farmhouse visitor and nature center is open Monday-Friday from 9:30am-4:30pm. A deep-water dock is available along with 2 BRLT courtesy moorings and dinghy for public use on a first-come basis for periods up to 24-hours. Disability parking is beside the farmhouse. Dogs must be leashed at all times.
