Trail Guide



OVENS MOUTH PRESERVE

Dover Rd & Dover Cross Rd
Boothbay, Maine

Ovens Mouth Preserve consists of two distinct peninsulas on the southern side of the Ovens Mouth, a deep, narrow tidal passage connecting the Back River to the large Cross River tidal basin. The eastern and western portions of the preserve are connected by a pedestrian bridge across a narrow cove. Visitors can explore over 5 miles of trails, including 3 miles of wooded shoreline. Trails feature partial water views, quiet coves, salt marsh, and stunning vistas. Hiking options range from easy to moderate. The Eastern Shore Loop provides an easy hike, while the Western Shore Loop includes some moderately challenging sections of trail with steep drop-offs. Parking and info kiosks are available on both Eastern and Western portions of the preserve. Due to its popularity and heavy visitation, dogs must be leashed at all times.
